Health Services

Medical Services

The Medical Services Wing (MSW) continued to deliver holistic care to patients with Spinal Cord Injury (SCI), orthopedic, rheumatologic, and neurological conditions through both outpatient and inpatient services. This year, MSW provided free rehabilitation services to 13 patients who suffered spinal cord injury during the historic Anti-Discrimination Movement of July 2024—an act aligned with CRP's commitment to emergency response in humanitarian ground.

Over the year, a multidisciplinary team, consisting of neuro-specialists, orthopedists, pediatricians, anesthesiologists, psychiatrists, physiotherapists, occupational therapist, speech & language therapist, counselor, nurses, ward assistants, and cleaners, worked tirelessly to provide patient-centered care. Outpatient visits reached a new high, challenging the current infrastructure of CRP.

Its Operation Theaters remained active with critical surgeries, including those performed in collaboration with national and international experts.

As part of its future vision, MSW plans to expand its Radiology and Pathology units to meet growing diagnostic needs and improve patient flow. It also aims to digitalise clinical services further and strengthen training programs in spinal rehabilitation and surgical care.

MSW remains a beacon of hope, resilience, and excellence for the people it serves.

Physiotherapy

The Physiotherapy Department of CRP is one of the largest Physiotherapy service providers in Bangladesh. This department provides specialised, evidence-based services to inpatients and outpatients of all ages with musculoskeletal, sports injury, neurological, and spinal cord conditions, aiming to enhance mobility, strength, and quality of life. Additionally, it offers a wide range of services, including treatment and patient education, clinical placement, skill-based training, awareness raising, accessibility improvements, and advocacy in various areas across Bangladesh.

Service provided in 2024-2025:

- 2,35,998 Physiotherapy appointments have been provided
- 33409 outpatients received Physiotherapy
- 316 SCI inpatients received Physiotherapy

International and National Courses for Improving Knowledge skills and Practice:

- 91 Physiotherapy professionals trained on “The McKenzie Method of Mechanical Diagnosis and Therapy (MDT): Module- A, B, C”, facilitated by certified instructors, in January and February 2025. This approach emphasises patient education and self-management, contributing to improving patient outcome.
- 21 Physiotherapy professionals completed “Spinal Pain Management” and “Mulligan Approach” courses, conducted for the betterment of musculoskeletal practice.
- A 6-day-long course on “Evidence-Based Practice on Stroke Management” was held, where more than 20 Physiotherapy professionals took part, intending to enhance their knowledge in stroke management.

From 26-28 September 2024, the Head of the Physiotherapy Department acted as a “Chair” while representing Bangladesh in the general meeting and scientific session of the Asian Western Pacific Region Congress in Bali, Indonesia.

As a whole, the Physiotherapy department of CRP endeavors to provide the best services to enhance the organisation's reputation in Bangladesh in the health and rehabilitation field.

Occupational Therapy

The Occupational Therapy (OT) Department is dedicated to providing evidence-based OT services to a diverse range of patients with physical and mental health needs. Patients diagnosed with neurological conditions, hand conditions, pediatric conditions, mental health issues, and others have improved their level of functional independence, participation, and quality of life after receiving OT services. The utmost dedication of OT professionals has increased the demand for services among users following successful rehabilitation measures. The use of evidence-based therapeutic exercises, various treatment modalities, engagement in purposeful activities, environmental modifications, and the provision of customised splints and assistive devices are key elements of OT interventions. The OT Department has also offered demand-based Accessibility Audits and Ergonomics consultancy.

Speech and Language Therapy

A Speech and Language Therapist, a healthcare professional, plays a crucial role in supporting individuals with disabilities by addressing cognitive-communication, voice, social communication, eating, and swallowing challenges to promote inclusion and participation in mainstream society. The professional roles and activities in Speech and Language Therapy include clinical/educational services (diagnosis, assessment, planning, and treatment), prevention, advocacy, education, administration, and research.

During the reporting year (2024-2025), Speech and Language Therapists provided services efficiently to Adult outpatients, Paediatric inpatients and outpatients, SRU unit, SCI unit, William and Marie Taylor School, Emergency Unit, and Multi-Disciplinary Team through individual and group sessions.

During this year, the department has benefited from the input of the pioneer SLT professional, Mel Adams, from the UK who has a great contribution in introducing SLT course in BHPI on 2004. She made her second visit to CRP in January 2025 and helped the department in both the management of clinical issues as well as for educational purposes.

In this reporting year, all 43 Speech and Language Therapists of CRP participated in several trainings (e.g., cerebral visual impairment and role of Speech and Language Therapist in NICU, adult neurology and swallowing management, pediatric and autism management, sign language, etc.).

The SLT Department is dedicated and passionate to provide evidence-based treatment by using unique and appropriate therapeutic materials in helping individuals overcome communication and swallowing challenges to improve their overall quality of life.

Paediatric Services

Children with different disabilities have been treated at CRP since 1995, when the first cohort of Physiotherapist and Occupational therapist completed study from BHPI with the help of foreign expert. A consolidative team consisting of paediatric consultants, Physiotherapists, Occupational therapists, Speech and Language therapists, nurses, and social welfare workers is devoted to delivering all-inclusive care, rehabilitation, and support to children with neurological and neurodevelopmental conditions. Their approach encompasses the physical, emotional, social, psychological, and economic aspects of care through Individual and group session, as well as community-based outreach programs. The regular two-week residential program allows 40 children with disabilities to receive comprehensive rehabilitation service as well as 40 mothers to learn how to continue their children's treatment at home.

World Cerebral Palsy Day and World Autism Awareness Day have been celebrated since 2012 as mass awareness-raising events.

This department has been enhancing its professionals' expertise through ongoing participation in a 'Training of Trainers' program, conducted in collaboration with MAITS-UK, focused on 'Working with Children with Neuro-Developmental Disorders' as well as 'Basic Paediatric Physiotherapy'; 'Ponseti Method Management' and 'Basic First Aid Management'. Occupational therapy students Rina Onishi and Yuri Udagawa from Tokyo Metropolitan University, Japan, exchanged their knowledge in this reporting year.

Stroke Rehabilitation Services

The Stroke Rehabilitation Unit (SRU) continued its dedicated efforts in providing multidisciplinary and evidence-based rehabilitation services to stroke survivors throughout the fiscal year 2024–2025. The unit upholds CRP’s commitment to client-centered care, aiming to restore function, independence, and quality of life post-stroke through holistic intervention by a coordinated team of physiotherapists, occupational therapists, and speech & language therapists.

Outpatient Rehabilitation: The SRU supported 336 beneficiaries, enabling progress across physical, cognitive, communicative, and psychosocial domains.

Home-Based Rehabilitation (HBR): The SRU conducted a total of 232 HBR sessions. This unique outreach service offered stroke patients personalised care at home. A team of PT, OT, and SLT professionals conducted joint visits to:

- Educate families about positioning, safe mobility, and transfers
- Teach home exercise programs
- Promote ADL participation in the natural environment
- Providing training on proper communication and swallowing techniques

This service improved caregiver competence and community reintegration.

These programs educated the patient and caregivers on:

- Early signs and symptoms of stroke
- Prevention strategies
- Importance of timely rehabilitation



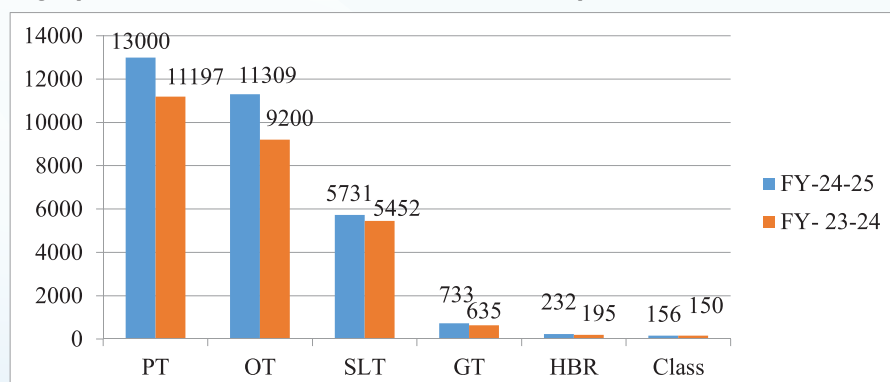

Group sessions promoted peer interaction, social motivation, and functional communication, with a focus on improving confidence and participation.

Mental Health Services

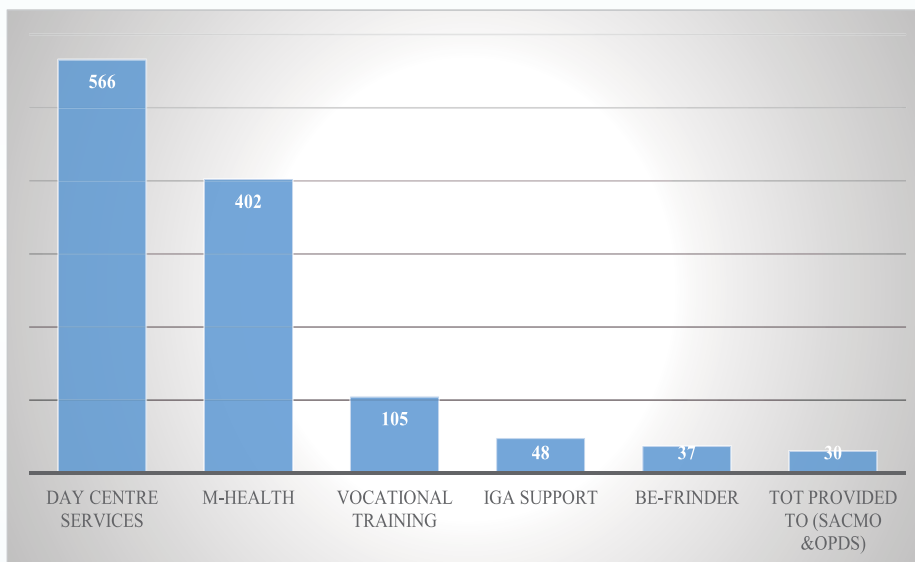
CRP established its first Mental Health Day Centre in March 2018 with donor support. In 2022, CRP expanded its mental health initiatives as a project by introducing community-based activities to promote awareness and inclusion through both CRP - Rabia Noor Mental Health Day Centre and CRP Mirpur Mental Health Day Centre. The Day Centres provided a safe platform for the people with mental health needs to develop and learn daily living skills through professional services, such as occupational therapy, psychosocial counselling and psychiatric consultancy for the people with mental health needs.



Clients celebrated World Occupational Therapy Day

Throughout the three-year and three-month project, a total of 566 individuals (380 males and 186 females) received comprehensive services; 387 clients at Rabia Noor Centre and 179 at Mirpur Centre. The project also trained 30 members of OPD (Organisation of Persons with Disabilities) and SACMOs (Sub-Assistant Community Medical Officer) as trainers (ToTs), who conducted 20 Community Sensitisation Workshops on Mental Health.

A follow-up survey of 487 discharged clients revealed that 82.69% had become productive and successfully reintegrated into society and increased their monthly income by BDT 2,000-17,000, while 37 secured local employment with earnings between BDT 3,000 and 21,000.

On 31 March 2025, "The North American Humanitarian Aid and Relief (NAHAR)" showed kindness and funded the continuation of the comprehensive services for people with mental health at CRP - Rabia Noor Mental Health Day Centre as a new project named "Mental Health Project (Intellectual Disabilities)". It was a two-month project which was started on 1st April, 2025, and concluded on 31st May, 2025. A total of 83 individuals (44 males and 39 females) underwent initial screening, and a total of 31 people (21 Males and 10 Females) with mental health needs were enrolled in the CRP-Rabia Noor Mental Health Day Centre for the comprehensive services.

Assistive Devices & Technologies

Prosthetics and Orthotics

The Prosthetics and Orthotics (P&O) Department of CRP continues to be a national leader in providing high-quality assistive devices for individuals with physical disabilities. As part of CRP's multidisciplinary rehabilitation team, the department focuses on enhancing mobility, independence, and overall quality of life for people with limb loss or neuromuscular and musculoskeletal impairments.

Highlights of the reporting period:

- 1,997 patients were served, including 1,160 new and 837 follow-up cases
- 2,393 assistive devices were delivered, including 2,264 orthotic and 129 prosthetics
- Two vital services were introduced-
 - Pre-Prosthetic Management, which prepares amputees for prosthetic fitting both physically and psychologically.
 - Diabetic Foot Assessment & Orthosis Support, aimed at preventing complications and enhancing mobility for diabetic patients.
- First Beneficiary and Technical Feedback survey conducted using Epi Info software, supported by ICRC, to evaluate service quality and patient satisfaction.
- Celebrated International Prosthetics and Orthotics Day on 5th November, with support from the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), promoting awareness and collaboration in the sector.

Suraiya's Journey to Independence: A Step Toward a Brighter Future

Nine-year-old Suraiya, born with a below-knee congenital amputation, used to hop and depend on her father to reach school. Her life changed after receiving a prosthetic limb from CRP's Prosthetics and Orthotics Department. Although the adjustment was initially challenging, Suraiya's determination and the team's support helped her learn to walk confidently within just seven days.



Today, Suraiya walks independently both indoors and outdoors and is ready to return to school with renewed confidence. Her transformation stands as an inspiring example of resilience and a testament to CRP's commitment to empowering children with disabilities through accessible rehabilitation and assistive technology.

Supportive Seating

The Supportive Seating Unit (SSU) at CRP has had an excellent year with the concept of "Supportive Seating for Independent Mobility" for children with cerebral palsy. This unit aims to provide high-quality mobility support and assistive devices to CRP clients and others across Bangladesh based on individual needs. Many children with cerebral palsy cannot sit independently; therefore, SSU produces supportive seating devices in three different designs for them. SSU also manufactures other rehabilitation devices, including wheelchair cushions, T-Roll, cervical collars, shoulder slings, D-Roll, gaiters, bed mattresses, lumbar rolls, and cervical pillows.

- 461 supportive seating chairs were delivered
- 215 follow-up appointments were conducted
- 260 assessments were conducted
- 267 children were screened
- 283 wooden chairs produced for children with disabilities
- 7,870 other assistive devices produced



Products of SSU

The unit also supported organisations such as Bachte Shekha, Joy Joy Dinajpur, Rescue Aid Trust, Sishu Polli Plus, Breaking the Silence, CZM, Handicaps International (HI), Children Hope (CH), Dhaka Proyash, Kapasia Protibondhi Kollyan Somity, Disabled Rehabilitation and Research Association (DRRA), to provide assistive devices and ensure proper seating for their clients.

The person in charge of SSU conducted four training sessions as a project coordinator in collaboration with MAITS and CRP on Neuro Developmental Disability (NDD) this year. Additionally, Jenny Simpson, project coordinator of the MAITS Program, visited CRP to hold project-related meetings.

Appropriate Paper-based Technology

The most popular products created by the APT unit include hand therapeutic toys, riding horses, balance boards, paper-made seating chairs, feeding chairs, and various showpieces. Every year, John and Janet, longstanding volunteers of CRP from UK, share their ideas and innovative thinking to improve APT production through training and discussion. APT possesses the capability to revolutionise the manufacturing of assistive devices that have conventionally been crafted from wood, leather, metal, and other expensive materials by utilising waste products such as discarded paper, plastic bottles, thin cardboard, and corrugated cardboard.

Rehabilitation Services

Community Based Rehabilitation

CBR is a strategy that promotes the inclusion of people with disabilities in their communities. It also aims to address unmet needs among these individuals. CRP began its CBR activities in 1996 to raise awareness about disability and to follow up with spinal cord injury patients within their communities. CBR remains a vital channel for discharged SCI patients to plan their future rehabilitation.

Today, CRP's CBR activities involve collaborating closely with people with disabilities and their families to overcome physical and social barriers within their communities. This is achieved through a holistic approach focused on the individual and their environment, covering areas such as health, education, livelihood, social inclusion, skill development, and empowerment.

CBR activities are carried out through the combined efforts of people with disabilities, their families, donors, organisations, communities, and relevant government and non-government health, education, vocational, social, and other services.

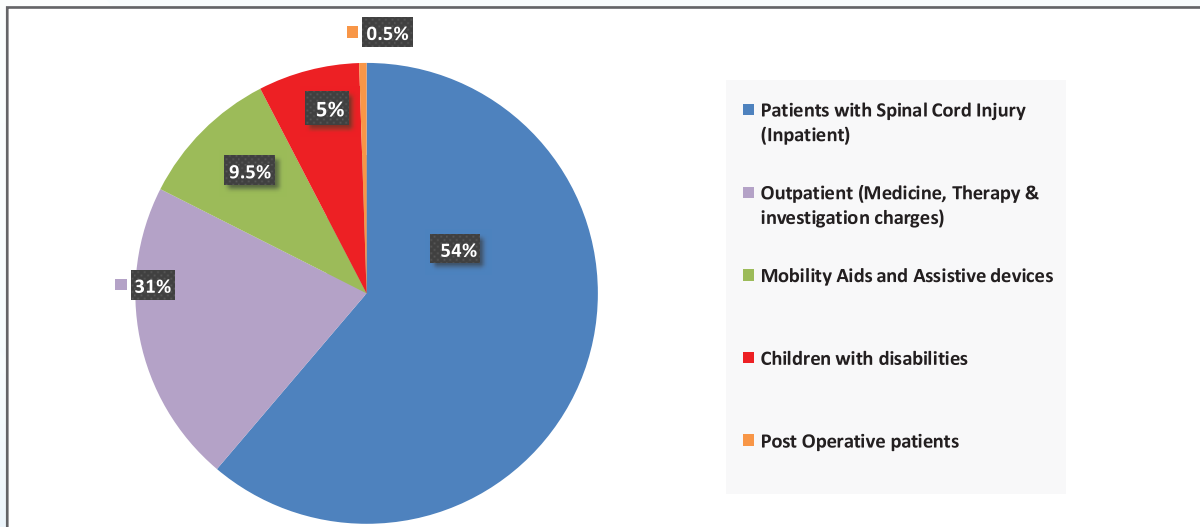
Social Welfare

The Social Welfare Department (SWD) is fully committed to supporting Bangladesh's most vulnerable group—people with disabilities. CRP believes no one should be left untreated once they enter CRP, as some impoverished patients, individuals with disabilities, and parents of children with disabilities cannot afford medical treatment, rehabilitation, or assistive devices. The SWD conducts socio-economic assessments of service seekers and utilises donor-funded subsidies to cover the costs of appropriate treatment, surgical procedures, medicines, and assistive devices for those with low socio-economic status. During the current high inflation, the SWD has responded effectively by providing subsidies on treatment costs, devices for individuals with spinal cord injuries, and support for persons and children with disabilities.

Counselling

Spinal cord injury (SCI) is a life-changing event that affects all aspects of daily life. Developing stress is common after SCI and can be insidious. It may build quietly over time, clouding the mind and reducing mental ability. It also weakens the immune system. After receiving services in various locations, people with SCI often enter CRP with misconceptions, and their family members are also influenced by these incorrect notions about rehabilitation. The counselling department supports people with SCI by helping them with coping strategies, focusing on dealing with loss, and practising mindful living. We explore clients' thinking patterns, acceptance of limitations, learning, and mastering new skills necessary for daily life in the 'real world.'

Counselling Services Overview for 2024-25:

New SCI cases: 316 new cases received counselling services addressing various psychosocial health needs.

Counselling sessions: 1,674 professional sessions, 1,792 peer sessions, and 349 spiritual sessions.

Psychosexual Services: 76 couples, 33 young adults, and 24 individuals with SCI in the community received psychosexual services, totaling 203 sessions.

Health Education MP3 Audio Clips: 47 admitted SCI patients received health education via MP3 format on their mobile phones.

Group Sessions: 370 sessions conducted, including psycho-education, role model sharing, audio sessions, reproductive health, sexual counselling, behavioural change, and capacity building.

Pressure Sores Phone Follow-up: 330 SCI patients were contacted, while 270 with pressure ulcers received telephonic intervention. 87% (236/270) of individuals with pressure ulcers have benefited from telehealth services in the community. Among them, 32% (87/270) have healed, and 68% (149/220) are improving.



Caregiver's Support

Tele-health Well-being Calls: 791 people with SCI were contacted by phone; 669 received telehealth services.

Post-discharge Follow-up: In this fiscal year, 224 clients with SCI received immediate follow-up calls after discharge to enhance resilience amid new challenges.

Special Services for Anti-discrimination Movement Injured: The CRP counselling department provided healthcare to those injured during the country's crisis.

- 42 individual counselling sessions were conducted
- 41 people received psychosocial support in 7 groups
- 72 ward rounds were participated in
- Mental health assessments completed for 63 individuals

CRP Madhab Memorial Vocational Training Institute

Vocational training for persons with disabilities is not just about employment; it is a pathway to dignity, independence, and inclusion. It equips individuals with practical skills aligned with their abilities, interests, and local job market opportunities.

Aligned with CRP's mission, the Madhab Memorial Vocational Training Institute (CRPMMVTI) offers free, inclusive training with accommodation, covering electronics repair, shop management, linking machine, IT, and tailoring (both local and industrial). Since 1999, it has empowered participants towards financial independence and became affiliated with the Bangladesh Technical Education Board (BTEB) in 2003.

The facility is disability-friendly, featuring ramps, accessible toilets, and sign language support. Training programs are adaptable and tailored to each individual's capabilities and learning pace, ensuring inclusivity and practicality. Instructors are trained in disability inclusion and adaptive teaching techniques.

Besides technical skills, training includes communication, self-confidence, and workplace behaviour. We also have strong job placement support and partnerships with inclusive employers to provide actual employment opportunities. Partnerships include ICRC, M&S, JULES, Swisscontact, and BSRM, among others. This year, we introduced a customised MS Office and digital marketing course for 20 trainees with disabilities under the BYETS project funded by Swisscontact. During this period, 302 persons with disabilities received vocational training, and 243 graduates were successfully employed.

Rehabilitation Services to Anti-Discrimination Movement Survivors

The recent Anti-Discrimination Movement in Bangladesh, which took place from mid-July to August 05, 2024, resulted in about 844 students and other individuals being killed, and more than 13,881 people severely injured and seeking medical services in Bangladesh. A few hundred survivors of the July uprising were referred to the CRP to receive necessary rehabilitation services. After initiating physical and psychological assessments, CRP extended its activities to help injured students and the general public recover their physical and mental health and ensure rehabilitation services for those affected by the recent unrest.

CRP was pleased to have some kind donors alongside to secure the necessary funds for providing these services. CRP acknowledges the generous donations and support from CZM, BMANA, FCRP- America, Mahmudul Huq, Monisha Anwar Huq, BDesh Foundation, Valerie Taylor Trust, Dr. Shafiqur Rahman (Ameer e- Jamaat-e-Islami), and Centre for Tajuddin Ahmed Research and Activism to support the rehabilitation of victims of the anti-discrimination movement.

Bangladesh Health Professions Institute (BHPI)

BHPI is dedicated to producing skilled health professionals for Bangladesh and beyond.

In 2024-2025, a total of 1,079 students studied at BHPI across-

- Master's programs: Physiotherapy (PT), Occupational Therapy (OT), Rehabilitation Science)
- Bachelor's programs: PT, OT, Speech & Language Therapy (SLT), Prosthetics & Orthotics (P&O)
- Diploma in Medical Technology (PT, OT, Laboratory Medicine)

The Bachelor's and Master's programs are affiliated with the Faculty of Medicine, University of Dhaka, while the diploma programs are accredited by the State Medical Faculty of Bangladesh and approved by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MOH&FW).

206 students completed their courses and obtained degrees in this reporting year.

CRP Nursing College

Public and private healthcare settings require nurses with increasing responsibilities and proactive roles to ensure effective healthcare. CRP Nursing College was established in 2004 to contribute to Bangladesh's healthcare sector by producing skilled and qualified nurses, addressing the high demand for professionals with real expertise.

CRP Nursing College currently offers a four-year B.Sc. in Nursing, affiliated with the University of Dhaka; a three-year Diploma in Nursing Science and Midwifery; and a three-year Diploma in Midwifery, both approved by the Bangladesh Nursing and Midwifery Council. At present, the number of students is 496.

William and Marie Taylor School

WMTS is an inclusive school of CRP established in 1993 that offers pre-school and primary education to children with and without disabilities. There are two units named the Inclusive Education Unit (IEU) and the Special Education Needs Unit (SENU). The IEU follows the national curriculum of Bangladesh, and SENU follows the Individual Education Plan (IEP).

WMTS has a dedicated team of 26 teachers and 3 therapists (PT, OT, and SLT). Therapists participated in different training, such as Basic First Aid Training, Sign Language Training, Paediatric Management, Speech Therapy Management, and Cerebral Visual Impairment and Role of Speech and Language Therapist in NICU; Feeding Assessment and Treatment Based on OPT.

In this reporting year, there were a total of 362 students, including 117 children with disabilities (32.32%). 32 children with special needs are staying at WMTS residence, and one house mother with 21 support staff look after them.

CRP Centres

CRP Mirpur, Dhaka

CRP Mirpur, established in 2003 with support from the Kadoorie Charitable Foundation, is a leading urban rehabilitation centre. Located in Mirpur-14, Dhaka, this modern 13-storeyed facility delivers comprehensive rehabilitation services to over 25,000 individuals annually—making it one of CRP's busiest and most impactful centres.

The centre offers holistic, multidisciplinary care through both inpatient and outpatient services. It includes specialised wards for stroke rehabilitation, neurology and paediatrics. A dedicated team of physiotherapists, occupational therapists,

speech and language therapists, prosthetists and orthotists, physicians, nurses, and support staff work collaboratively to provide personalised, goal-oriented rehabilitation treatment. The paediatric unit and autism corner focus on early intervention and developmental care for children with special needs.

CRP Mirpur is equipped with a full range of support services, including pharmacy, pathology, radiology, mental health counselling, and home-based (domiciliary) rehabilitation. The Aware Shop offers assistive devices and therapeutic products for patients and caregivers.

To support its sustainability, the centre generates income through rental spaces on the upper floors of the building—balancing social responsibility with financial stability. With rising demand, CRP Mirpur is actively expanding its inpatient services, introducing group therapy programs for conditions like osteoarthritis and diabetes, and advancing its research and innovation in the field of rehabilitation.

CRP Mirpur stands as an example of hope, restoring dignity and independence to thousands of individuals with disabilities each year. It reflects CRP's firm commitment to inclusive, compassionate, and life-changing care.

CRP Moulvibazar - Afsarul & Aktarul Haque Centre

CRP Moulvibazar - Afsarul & Aktarul Haque Centre began offering rehabilitation services in April 2011 and shifted to its own building in February 2022. The building was constructed with the generous support of Embassy of Japan in Bangladesh. This centre is providing outdoor-based physiotherapy, occupational therapy, and speech & language therapy. Besides that, campaign-based prosthetics & orthotics and supportive seating services are also running. With the gradual increase in service demand, temporary adjustments have been made to accommodate newly recruited therapists. A new Japanese ultrasound machine has also been

purchased and installed at CRP Moulvibazar, funded jointly by local donors from Moulvibazar (75%) and CRP (25%). A team from the Embassy of Japan visited CRP Moulvibazar on 22 May 2025, marking the third consecutive year of their annual visit to observe the centre's services. CRP Moulvibazar Centre continues to subsidise service costs for underprivileged patients on a regular basis keeping alignment with the vision of CRP.

CRP Chattogram - A. K. Khan Centre

CRP Chattogram - A. K. Khan Centre has been a beacon of hope for persons with disabilities throughout the Chattogram division since 2011. This centre legitimately provides rehabilitation services through physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech and language therapy, and prosthetics and orthotics (P & O) professionals to support the physical, emotional, economic, and social development of all beneficiaries. Job placement, home visits, organisations of persons with disabilities (OPD) support, livelihood (self-employment) support, and awareness programs on disability are executed and supported by this centre. To foster proper engagement with stakeholders, the centre works closely with government agencies and local and international NGOs. Since its inception, the centre has delivered a significant number of services to people with disabilities, although inadequacy of many resources. Additionally, this centre has been providing prosthesis and orthosis services to Rohingya people with disabilities through a diversified project concept. Ultimately, this will enable CRP to extend or replicate P & O services to 'Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals' (FDMN) or across Bangladesh. This centre is regarded as the Southern Regional Service Centre, akin to the CRP Head Office.

CRP Rajshahi - Afsar Hussain Centre

CRP established a divisional service centre in Rajshahi in 2013 with financial support from the people and the Government of Japan. The land for the centre was generously donated in 2011 by Mr. Mohammad Mazharul Hannan, son of the late Afsar Hussain, and his family.

The activities and services of this centre are supported by the Integrated Disability and Livelihood Project (IDLP) and the Rights, Rehabilitation, and Empowerment for Persons with Disabilities (RRED) project, both funded by CBM Global Disability Inclusion. Through these projects, the centre promotes inclusive rehabilitation, enhances livelihood opportunities, and empowers persons with disabilities to participate more fully in community life.

CRP Rajshahi Centre provides a comprehensive range of services to support persons with disabilities. The centre offers therapeutic services, including physiotherapy, occupational therapy, and speech & language therapy, prosthetics & orthotics as well as the provision of other assistive devices. In addition, the centre conducts various other services, such as medical check-ups, awareness programs on disability, and school-based awareness initiatives. It also supports the formation of self-help groups for persons with disabilities, organises advocacy and consultation meetings, provide livelihood support and runs free health campaigns to enhance community engagement and overall wellbeing.

CRP Barishal - CARSA Foundation Centre

CRP Barishal - CARSA Foundation Centre is a divisional centres of CRP located at Kashipur, Barisal. The centre started its journey in 2013 with the mission to promote an environment where people with disabilities from the Barisal division can easily access the CRP services.

At present, the centre offers a wide range of services to support persons with disabilities. These include medical care and therapeutic services such as physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech & language therapy, Psychological Counselling, and Diabetic Foot Care. The centre also provides prosthetics & orthotics as well as prescribes and distributes other assistive devices. In addition, it conducts awareness-raising activities on disability, provide livelihood support and supports the organisation of Persons with Disabilities (OPD) to foster community engagement and empowerment.

Started in May 2017, CRP Sylhet - Iskandar Shitara Centre operates as the Divisional centre of CRP. Currently based in a rented premises at Shahjalal Upshohor, the centre exclusively offers outpatient treatment services, which include vital provisions such as physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech and language therapy, community-based rehabilitation services, along with regular prosthesis and orthotics campaigns. Despite functioning from a rented building, the centre remains dedicated to providing essential rehabilitation services that enhance community well-being in Sylhet.

CRP Mymensingh - BAU Centre

CRP Mymensingh - BAU Centre is located in the Mymensingh division, which began operations on July 15, 2017. It is an old single-storied building temporarily handed over by the Bangladesh Agricultural University authority for the use of CRP in Mymensingh, Bangladesh. At present, the Centre offers only outpatient treatment services including physiotherapy, occupational therapy, and speech & language therapy. It also organises regular campaign-based services for prosthetics & orthotics, supportive seating, various assistive devices, and mobility aids measurement and distribution. Additionally, the centre provides community-based rehabilitation (CBR) services across the wider Mymensingh region. A multidisciplinary team of five full-time physiotherapists, three occupational therapists, and three speech & language therapists currently delivers specialised rehabilitation services. Despite challenges arising from its temporary setup and limited space, this centre has served the highest number of patients during the reporting year.

CRP Manikganj

CRP Manikganj extends vital rehabilitation and empowerment services to a regional community with limited access to specialised care. Through its holistic model combining therapeutic intervention, medical consultancy, and vocational training—the centre plays a vital role in promoting health, inclusion, and economic autonomy for persons with disabilities in Manikganj. The centre operates through a multidisciplinary team of healthcare professionals, therapists, and social workers, following a rights-based and inclusive approach. In this reporting year, it introduced a new service, a hand splinting unit under the occupational therapy department through the “Equitable and Inclusive Health and Rehabilitation for Persons with Disabilities (EIHRPD)” project. EIHRPD is a project being implemented in partnership with CBM Global Disability Inclusion. Staff and vocational trainees of this centre observed International Women’s Day, World Spinal Cord Injury Day, and International Day of Persons with Disabilities, along with the local governments of Manikganj.

Projects

"Regional Inter-professional Master's Program in Rehabilitation Science-Phase II" funded by SAARC Development Fund

"Regional Inter-professional Master's Program in Rehabilitation Science-Phase II" funded by SAARC Development Fund (SDF), provided 29 scholarships to the 7th and 8th batches of students from SAARC Member States.

During the reporting year, the program continued to build regional capacity in the field of rehabilitation science by awarding scholarships and facilitating cross-border academic participation.

- 16 students of the 7th batch completed the Part II (Final) examinations of the M.Sc. in Rehabilitation Science (MRS); among them: 12 from Bangladesh, one from Sri Lanka, one from Bhutan, and two from Nepal.
- 13 Bangladeshi students from the 8th batch completed Part I of their studies.

A faculty of the MRS Department participated in the 23rd ASCoN Conference in Nepal from 23rd to 25th November, 2024 and alongside the conference, there was a discussion with seven alumni and one 7th batch student from Nepal regarding alumni collaboration and more participation of students from SAARC member states in the master's program.

Local and international students visited CRP - Rabia Noor Mental Health Day Center to gain practical exposure in mental health rehabilitation as a part of their elective coursework.

Mr. Stephen Muldoon, Consultant for CRP Strategic Plan (2025-2030), delivered two lectures to the 7th and 8th batch students on "Strengthening the Rehabilitation Sector and System through Strategic Leadership, Partnership, and Innovation".

During this reporting year, two MRS faculties were active contributors to a research project named "Government Health Services for People with Spinal Cord Injury in Bangladesh" funded by CBM Global Disability Inclusion and conducted by a team of BHPI.

Disability Assessment and Rehabilitation Cost Analysis for Injured Workers in Readymade Garments Sector

“Disability Assessment and Rehabilitation (DAR) Cost Analysis for Injured Workers in Readymade Garments Sector” titled project was started its journey in December 2023 with GIZ funds, which will end in September 2025. The aim of this project is to:

1. Develop and propose an index of estimated rehabilitation costs based on 100 RMG/other industries workers with work-related injury/disability.
2. Develop a disability assessment tool to measure the severity of disability.
3. Conduct the disability assessment for up to 100 victims of workplace injury from the RMG sector.

Activities and achievements of the project (2024-2025):

1. A day-long workshop was organised on 2nd October 2024 on "Development of the Disability Assessment Tool for the People with Disabilities from workplace injury in the Readymade Garments (RMG) Sector" with 28 participants from different stakeholders, including GIZ, EIS, ILO, BKMEA, BEPZA, etc.
2. The Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) of cost calculation has been prepared in consultation with the health economist from the University of Dhaka and shared with GIZ for the final feedback.
3. Cost calculation of 85 cases from CRP has been done, and a short report has been prepared on the findings.
4. Modification of disability assessment form has been done by the disability expert team, which is being finalised through a workshop with stakeholders.
5. A draft guideline for the modified assessment has been prepared.
6. An external translator and 3 internal translators worked on the Bangla translation of the assessment and guideline.

Equitable and Inclusive Health and Rehabilitation for Persons with Disabilities

Since December 2022, CRP has been implementing the “Equitable and Inclusive Health and Rehabilitation for Persons with Disabilities (EIHRPD)” project in partnership with CBM Global Disability Inclusion. The project aims to promote equitable and accessible rehabilitation services for individuals with disabilities.

Activities and achievements (2024-2025):

- 9 disability screening campaigns reached 996 individuals referred for essential health and rehabilitation services.
- 5 awareness-raising campaigns engaged 413 community members and fostered a better understanding of disability rights, inclusion, and preventive health practices.
- 16 local advocacy meetings involved 383 stakeholders, focused on ensuring disability inclusion in social safety nets and development initiatives.
- 2 advisory meetings with local government representatives in Harirampur and Daulatpur, engaged 85 participants.
- 2 workshops on the ‘Disability Rights and Protection Act 2013’ at the Manikganj District Commissioner’s office and the Civil Surgeon’s office, reaching 78 government officials and community representatives.
- 3 coordination meetings for OPDs with 50 participants, to promote collaboration and joint planning.
- Representation of OPD members in 9 different committees, engaging 206 stakeholders, ensuring their voices are heard in important decision-making processes.
- 4 capacity-building training for 113 participants to enhance knowledge and skills.
- Training on District Social Services (DSS) registration and compliance for the leaders.
- 43 assistive devices and 43 rounds of medication support were provided to enhance the daily lives of individuals with disabilities.
- 183 health professionals received practical guidance from 4 workshops focused on SCI management at the upazila level, specifically in Manikganj Sadar, Harirampur, Ghior, and Daulatpur.
- A meeting with the Manikganj Sadar Hospital Authority included 25 participants, aiming to promote inclusive rehabilitation within district-level health facilities.
- 4,291 Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials were produced and distributed to enhance community awareness.

Advocacy & Networking

The Advocacy and Networking Department plays a vital role in promoting the rights and inclusion of persons with disabilities (PWDs). To fulfill this mission, the department organises awareness-raising programs and actively participates in various meetings, seminars, and events with government and non-government organisations. Additionally, it disseminates information about the services offered by CRP.

As part of its awareness-raising activities, this department organised several day-long celebration events, including World Spinal Cord Injury Day, National Road

Safety Day, World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims, International Day of Persons with Disabilities (IDPD), and more during this reporting year. It also held art competitions at two local schools to raise awareness among students about road safety rules. Furthermore, it conducted a workshop focused on the current challenges and future needs of OPDs (Organisations of Persons with Disabilities) on the eve of IDPD, which was attended by around 20 OPDs.

Throughout the reporting year, this department coordinated visits by numerous educational institutions, national and international organisations, including PROYASH (Institute of Special Education, Bangladesh Army), Popular Medical College, Independent University Bangladesh, Nursing College Mitford, BPATC, GOC Savar, Hiroshima University Japan, Kokorozashi Japan Ltd., and others. These visits aimed to promote CRP's services and garner support for the rights and well-being of persons with disabilities.

This department also coordinated an interview session titled "Understanding the experiences of CRP service providers, patients, and caregivers," organised by WHO. It supported Quantum Foundation in arranging a session on "Stress management and total fitness."

Representatives from this department actively participated in various seminars and discussion sessions organised by stakeholders such as BRAC, B-SCAN, WDDF, BFPA, and others.

Looking ahead, the Advocacy and Networking Department remains committed to creating a more inclusive society where persons with disabilities can live empowered, independent lives with dignity and upheld rights.

Human Resources

During the reporting period from July 1, 2024, to June 30, 2025, the Human Resources Department at CRP remained focused on building a resilient, responsive, and people-centered workforce. The department continued to serve as a strategic partner by managing critical HR functions such as talent acquisition, employee engagement, professional development, compensation management, and workplace harmony.

HR placed increased emphasis on nurturing a supportive and empowering work environment that values every individual.
