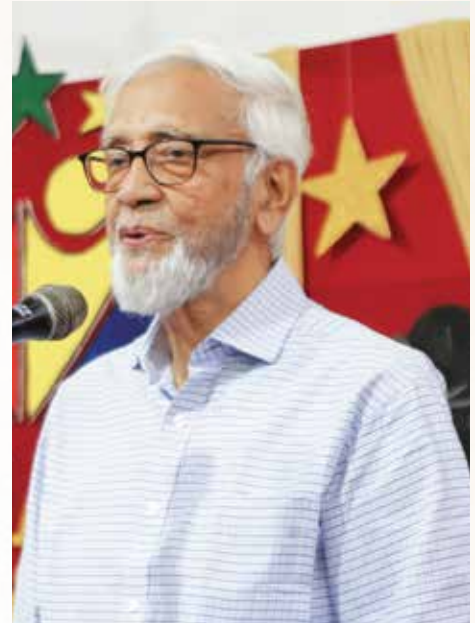


## Message from the Chairman, TRP

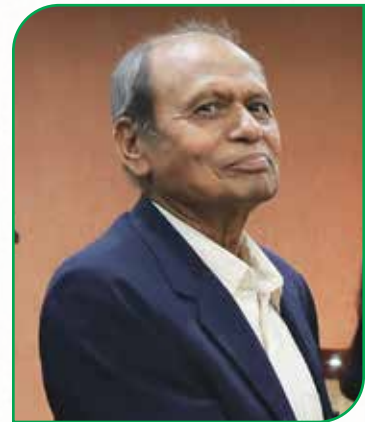

# Health Services

## Medical Services

Medical Services Wing (MSW) is committed to providing comprehensive care and rehabilitation for patients with Spinal Cord Injuries (SCI) and other neurological, rheumatological, and orthopedic conditions.

In this year, MSW has been dedicated to improving the lives of countless patients. The multidisciplinary team of specialists, including neurologists, neurosurgeons, pediatricians, orthopedic surgeons, physiatrists, psychiatrists, anesthesiologists, and plastic surgeons, works collaboratively to offer a holistic approach to patient care from admission to rehabilitation which are tailored to the unique needs of each patient. The outpatient department has also experienced remarkable growth, catering to nearly 62,678 patients with neurological, rheumatological, and orthopedic conditions. Commitment to evidence-based practice ensures that patients receive the most effective and up-to-date treatments with minimal cost.

Last year Prof. Dr. Luis Garcia, a Spanish surgeon, revisited CRP to perform some challenging spine surgeries.

To further enhance services, MSW aims to expand Human Resources, implement an Electronic Medical Record (EMR) system, and strengthen collaborations with tertiary hospitals. The ultimate goal of this service is to establish a training centre for spine surgery, rehabilitation, and rehabilitation nursing care.

## Physiotherapy

The Physiotherapy Department (PTD) of CRP, is a pioneer in providing specialised and a wide spectrum of physiotherapy services, treating patients with musculoskeletal injuries, neurological disorders, spinal cord injuries, sports injuries and pediatric disorders. It focuses on improving mobility, strength, pain-free life, and functional independence, catering for both inpatients and outpatients of all ages.

22,102 outpatients with musculoskeletal and neurological conditions received treatment, whilst a multidisciplinary team approach catered for 329 in-patients with spinal cord injuries (SCI).

This year, the PT Department organized some specialized International Courses aimed at improving the skills and knowledge of physiotherapists. Specifically, “The McKenzie Method of Mechanical Diagnosis and

Therapy” this course has enabled 55 physiotherapists working within CRP to carry out techniques for diagnosis and treating musculoskeletal disorders. This approach emphasizes patient education and self-management, contributing to better patient outcomes.

In collaboration with the Bangladesh Physiotherapy Association (BPA), the Physiotherapy department celebrated World Physiotherapy Day on 8th September 2023 and arranged many TV programs, webinars, seminars, also making a documentary film to raise awareness about spinal injuries.

The Physiotherapy Department of CRP is committed to delivering a comprehensive and outstanding service to raise the profile of CRP in the health and rehabilitation sector of Bangladesh.

# Occupational Therapy

The Occupational Therapy (OT) Department is expanding its services to meet the current demand in the field of rehabilitation. The evidence-based OT practice is the key to delivering quality rehabilitation services for patients with physical and mental health needs.

A hard-working, skilled, and dedicated team of Occupational Therapists (OTs) are working tirelessly to improve patient's level of functional independence by enhancing their participation and quality of life. This is done through the use of therapeutic exercises, a variety of treatments, engagement in purposeful activities, with environmental modification and customised splints and assistive devices.

This year, the outpatient service of the OT department, CRP Savar provided treatment to 3,779 patients. The Hand Therapy and Splinting unit provided 1,357 customised splints including 3D printed splints and assistive devices. In the OT

Spinal Cord Injury (SCI) in-patient unit 252 patients have completed a full sessional course of rehabilitation out of a total of 329 admissions. The functional outcomes based on SCIM (Spinal Cord Independence Measure) for individuals with SCI were completely independent 21 (8%), independent with modified environment 140 (56%), independent with moderate support 56 (22%) & independent with maximum support 35 (14%). 1,315 group therapy sessions were conducted where the number of participants (multiple entry) was 9,253.

Basic and Advanced courses on the “Bobath Concept” from International Bobath Instructors Training have added a new dimension to OT intervention for patients with neurological conditions (especially for stroke patients). Ms. Beatrice Mix, a Hand Therapist from Germany volunteered for 3 months at the Hand Therapy Unit.

## Speech & Language Therapy

**Group therapy plays an important role to foster social interaction and communication skills**

Speech & Language Therapy is a fundamental and life-changing treatment service for people with communication, cognition, and swallowing (eating & drinking) impairments for all age groups. The Speech & Language Therapist initiates services with initial screening and is responsible for assessment and diagnosis. They also give advice regarding management, intervention, treatment, developing plans of care to help restore, improve, and maintain identified skills and function in their clients.

During the reporting year (2023-2024), Speech and Language Therapists provided services to adult outpatients, Paediatric inpatients and outpatients, patients of the Stroke Rehabilitation Unit, the SCL unit, William and Marie Taylor School, along with the Multi-Disciplinary Team. The demand has increased daily, and 6,106 patients (both adult and children) received Speech & Language Therapy

service through individual sessions and group sessions including 97 patients with SCL.

The speech and language (SLT) professionals are committed to providing excellent service to patients by maintaining the core values and service standards. They use evidence-based therapeutic techniques according to the diagnosis of patients and give therapy using their handmade and purchased materials. This year Speech and Language therapists from centres within CRP participated in several training sessions including adult neuro management, oral placement therapy and autism management.

## Stroke Rehabilitation Services

The Stroke Rehabilitation Unit (SRU) of CRP is a specialized facility designed to cater for the comprehensive needs of individuals recovering from strokes. This unit offers a multidisciplinary approach to care, involving a team of healthcare professionals such as Physiotherapists, Occupational therapists, and Speech & Language therapists, who work collaboratively to help patients regain function and independence.

In the SRU, patients undergo a personal assessed rehabilitation program that includes physiotherapy to improve mobility and strength, occupational therapy to improve activities of Basic Activities of Daily Livings (BADL's) and Instrumental Activities of Daily Livings (IADL's). Also, speech & language therapy to address communication and swallowing

difficulties. The team also focuses on maximizing the patient's functional independence and well-being during recovery.

This year, SRU treated 281 patients including Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, and Speech & Language therapy. Moreover, this unit offered group therapy sessions to 635 participants and completed 195 home-based rehabilitation sessions.

SRU aims not only to restore physical function but also to enhance overall quality of life for patients, empowering them to reintegrate into their communities with improved abilities and confidence. Family members are often included in the rehabilitation process, receiving education on how to support their loved one post-discharge and understanding the challenges and progress of the patient.

## Paediatric Services

Since 2012 professionals working in this department have been improving their knowledge by attending an ongoing 'Training of Trainers' program in collaboration with MAITS-UK on "Working with Children with Neuro-Developmental Disorders". Also, they received training on "Postural Control and Breathing Challenge" for integrating cardiopulmonary and postural control strategies in the paediatric population in 2023.

A skilled multidisciplinary team of Paediatric Consultants, Physiotherapists, Occupational therapists, Speech and Language therapists, nurses, as well as social welfare workers are working with great devotion to provide treatment, rehabilitation, and support services to children with neurological and neurodevelopmental conditions. These services focus on physical, emotional, social, psychological and economic concerns regarding these children with different neurological and neurodevelopmental disorders in goal-oriented individual and group therapies along with outreach programs.

2023-2024 there were 1,875 new children with neurological and neurodevelopmental disorders such as cerebral palsy referred, 692 new children with autism spectrum disorders. Also 1,664 new and previously treated children with club feet received treatment as outpatients. There were also 866 new children with cerebral palsy who received treatment as inpatients.

Students of Occupational therapy namely Aldina Murphy from Robert Gordon University, Scotland; Yamada, Nagai, and Ikeuly from Tokyo Metropolitan University, Japan and Tasnia Ahad and Hamza Tareen, MBBS students from King's College Medical School, London observed and shared their knowledge in the Paediatric department.

# Assistive Devices & Technology

## Prosthetics and Orthotics

During 2023-2024, the Prosthetics and Orthotics department has achieved remarkable growth and introduced innovation in its service provision. Achieving excellence in working with patients remains the priority for the staff of the department. Throughout the year they provided services to 6,114 patients, including screening, assessment, and follow-up, and delivered 5,843 devices in Savar (Head office), Mirpur, Barisal, Chattogram, and Rajshahi.

The team works in a multidisciplinary (MDT) approach that involves Physiotherapists, and Prosthetists & Orthotists where they also refer patients to other health professionals as necessary.

Multiple training sessions have been conducted among staff with the sponsorship of Human Study and the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) to CRP to enhance their skills

and foster a continuous learning process on evidence-based practice. Essential Management Program (EMP) is now an ongoing process to enhance leadership skills and staff motivation.

From 2023, the mobile health camp has become a regular activity to ensure the accessibility of service in remote areas and in centres where there is no Prosthetics and Orthotics service available. In total 500 patients received services from the outreach program at Sylhet, Moulvibazar, Mymensingh, and Jessore.

ICRC, a longstanding partner of CRP in supporting the Prosthetics and Orthotics department have now ceased their involvement so CRP has started planning for self-purchase and have already received the Import Registration Certificate (IRC) which is crucial to import goods internationally.

## Supportive Seating

The total number of assistive devices produced from SSU was 1,009. The Unit also supported Bachte Shekha, Sishu Polli Plus, CZM, Handicap International (HI), Mother Teresa's Home, BRAC, ICRC, Children Hope (CH), Dhaka Proyash, Kapasia Protibondhi Kollyan Somity, Breaking the Silence with assistive devices and ensuring proper seating for their clients. The person in charge of SSU conducted 3 training sessions in collaboration with MAITS (Multi Agency International Training Support) on Neuro-Developmental Disability (NDD) and another 3-training session related to wheelchair service provision in Bangladesh. During this year the SSU has customised 2 wheelchair frames for children with Cerebral Palsy and Spinal Cord Injury patients with the help of Motivation India. The SSU team participated in 24 health camps for device selection and prescription during this reporting period.

The Supportive Seating Unit (SSU) produces high-quality mobility aids and assistive devices to clients all over Bangladesh according to their individual needs. Also modified supportive seats and wheelchairs for children with disabilities (CWD) providing health, functional developmental, mental, and social benefits. SSU has passed another successful year with the concept of "Supportive Seating for Independent Mobility" for children with cerebral palsy and other neurodevelopmental disorders. Many children with Cerebral Palsy cannot sit independently therefore SSU produces supportive seating devices in three different designs for them. SSU produces rehabilitation devices including lumbar rolls, cervical pillows, wheelchair cushions, shoulder slings, D-rolls, T-rolls, cervical collars, and bed mattresses. During this year, the unit produced 463 supportive seating chairs, and 237 wooden chairs for children with disabilities.



## Appropriate Paper-based Technology

APT Unit staffs are making APT Products

Appropriate paper-based technology uses materials of little cost to make something useful. It makes a wide range of strong useful articles from various forms of waste paper and cardboard with a paste made of flour and water. The APT unit produces numerous assistive devices using wastepaper in low-resource situations. The most popular products created by APT include feeding chairs, hand therapeutic toys, rocking horse, paper seating chairs, balance boards, and different types of show pieces. Every year John and Janet (longstanding volunteers of CRP ) share their ideas and

innovative thinking to improve APT production through training and discussion. APT has the potential to change the production of assistive devices as traditionally these were made from wood, leather, metal, and other expensive materials to now using waste materials like-plastic bottles, thin cards, wastepaper, and corrugated cardboard. During this year the APT delivered over 2,000 items of which Handicap International received over 1,000. The unit is grateful to Hameem Group for donating the required raw materials.

# Rehabilitation Services



**Income Generating Activities (IGA) support by CBR**

Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) was initiated by the WHO following the Declaration of Alma-Ata in 1978, to enhance the quality of life for people with disabilities and their families, to meet their basic needs, and ensure their inclusion and participation.

In 1996 CBR shared an awareness campaign about disability and the follow-up process for spinal cord injury patients in their community. CBR is an important channel for discharged persons with SCI regarding their future rehabilitation and the way forward.

## Community Based Rehabilitation

Nowadays, CBR activities within CRP work closely with people with disabilities and their families to overcome physical and sociological barriers within their communities, through a holistic approach to their health, education, livelihood, social inclusion, skill development, and empowerment.

The activities within CRP are implemented through the combined efforts of people with disabilities and their families, organizations for person with disabilities (OPD), donors and communities, as well as the relevant governmental and non-governmental health, education, vocational, social, and other services.

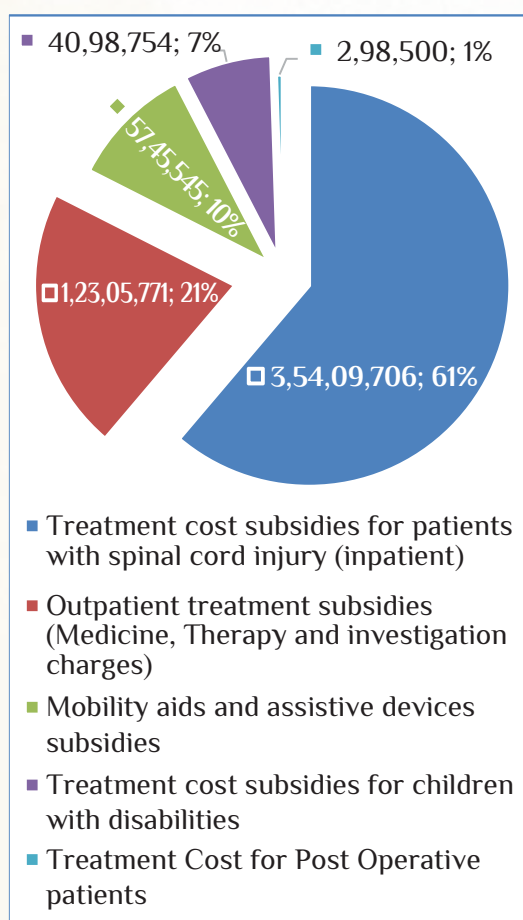
**Socio-economic assessment of patient at SWD**

The Social Welfare Department (SWD) of CRP is dedicated to helping vulnerable persons with disabilities (PWD) within Bangladesh. CRP believes

in including all individuals with disabilities regardless of their background or position in the overall society - no one should be excluded who cannot afford medical treatment, rehabilitation, and assistive device costs. The SWD administers a socioeconomic assessment for those requiring the services of CRP. This need is assisted by donor-funded subsidies to ensure appropriate treatment, surgical interventions, medicines, and assistive device costs for patients with poor socioeconomic status. The SWD also responds appropriately to the current high inflation costs for inpatients by providing subsidies regarding treatment for all people with SCI, including children with disabilities.

## CRP Madhab Memorial Vocational Training Institute

Article 27 of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (2006) recognizes the right of persons with disabilities to work on an equal basis with others; this includes the right to apply for employment in a labor market which should include vocational training, employment opportunities, job retention and ensure opportunities to return to work in an inclusive environment. Since 1999, CRP Madhab Memorial Vocational Training Institute (CRPMMVTI) under the Rehabilitation Wing of CRP has been providing free vocational training to people with disabilities in vocational trade courses funded by various donor groups to make them economically self-reliant and socially empowered by creating skilled human resources.

Nowadays a person with disabilities can find help to become socially independent by acquiring work skills through CRPMMVTI. During this reporting period, 369 people with disabilities received vocational training and among them 263 training graduates with disabilities were deployed to employment.

**Group Counseling Session with Patient Caregiver**

Spinal Cord Injury (SCI) is a life-changing event that affects all aspects of daily living. Stress is a common factor after SCI and can lead to serious depression. The counseling department helps people with SCIs to deal with all aspects of their loss. The Counselors explore with them new ways of thinking, and acceptance of their new current situation and to learn new skills that are important to incorporate into daily life in the context of the “real world.”

#### **Counseling Services in 2023-24:**

- ❑ **New SCI cases:** 323 new SCI patients received counseling services in various aspects of psychosocial health needs.
- ❑ **Counseling sessions:** 1,766 professional counseling sessions, 1,817 peer counseling sessions, and 358 spiritual counseling sessions.
- ❑ **Psychosexual Services:** 84 couples and 45 young adults as well as 33 people with SCI in the community had received psychosexual service under 248 sessions.

## **Counseling**

- ❑ **Health Education MP3 audio clip shared:** 174 admitted patients with SCI received MP3 format health education via mobile phones.
- ❑ **Group Sessions:** 318 group sessions were conducted including psychoeducation, role model sessions, audio sessions, reproductive health and sexual counseling groups, behavioral changes, and capacity building.
- ❑ **Pressure Sores Phone Follow-up:** 335 SCI patient with pressure ulcers received telephonic interventions and among them 86% (288 of 335) benefited via telehealth service regarding pressure ulcer problems in the community. 30% (99 of 335) of pressure sores have healed up, and 56% (189 of 335) are improving.
- ❑ **Tele-health well-being phone call services for people with SCI in communities:** 917 people with SCI were communicated by phone where 707 patients received tele-health service.
- ❑ **Post-discharge Immediate phone follow-up service:** 167 clients with SCIs received a phone call to do follow-up immediately after discharge to increase resilience in the community with new challenges.

## Sports and Recreational Activities

In recent years, CRP has been promoting inclusive events and following policies and practices to improve the chance of people with disabilities to participate in society. CRP believes sports can serve as a great medium for people with disabilities in terms of the positive impact on the quality of life and functional status. Engagement in sports results in improved self-discipline, positive self-esteem, social awareness, and empowerment of people with disabilities. The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) is one of the long-established disability inclusion activities partners of CRP helping them to develop skills and promote national and international sports participation.

CRP Nursing College is an academic institute of CRP. It was established in 2004 to contribute to the healthcare sector in Bangladesh by producing skilled and qualified nurses. There is a huge demand for nurses, who are appropriately trained. Public and private healthcare sectors require nurses who are appropriately trained and skilled with advanced proactive roles to ensure high quality health care services.

CRP Nursing College was established to address the growing demand for skilled nurses. Currently it offers B.Sc. in Nursing – this is a 4-year course affiliated by the University of Dhaka. Also, the Diploma in Nursing Science and Midwifery which is a 3 year course and Diploma in Midwifery also for 3 years are all approved by Bangladesh Nursing Council.

## William and Marie Taylor School

Established in 1993, the William & Marie Taylor School (WMTS) is CRP's inclusive educational institution, consisting of two distinct units: the Inclusive Education Unit (IEU) and the Special Education Needs Unit (SENU). The IEU follows the national curriculum of Bangladesh, while the SENU implements Individual Education Plans (IEP) tailored to each student's individual needs. In the reporting year WMTS had a dedicated team of 26 teachers, alongside 1 physiotherapist, 1 occupational therapist, 1 speech and language therapist, and 348 young students. Among these 125 were children with disabilities (CWD), making up 36% of the total student number. Of these 125 students 62 were enrolled in the IEU, while 63 with more individualized educational needs attended the SENU.

A multidisciplinary approach, involving physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech and language therapy and horse-riding therapy, supports children with a wide range of disabilities. Currently, 35 children with special needs reside at WMTS, where a house mother and 20 support staff care for them.

### CRP Mirpur, Dhaka

CRP Mirpur has a specialized stroke rehabilitation unit where a total of 62 patients can be admitted for rehabilitation services. It has 16 Cabins (AC/Non-AC), 7 Mini Cabins, a 23 Bedded Male Ward and a 16 Bedded Female Ward.

It has 11 beds for paediatric in-patient rehabilitation service.

Through a two-week package of care, the mother or caregiver of children with disabilities, especially children with Cerebral Palsy can learn how to give appropriate care for their children and how to provide basic therapeutic exercises at home.

## CRP Ganakbari, Dhaka

This centre supports the reintegration of women with spinal cord injuries (SCI) into mainstream society by offering appropriate training, along with a workshop for the development of assistive devices and mobility aids thus contributing to income-generating activities. Additionally, Marks & Start Industrial Project operates at this centre, providing ready-made garments (RMG) with training that leads to job opportunities. The women's rehabilitation unit offers skilled training in sewing and handcrafted items, with

The centre's activities and services are supported by two projects between CRP and CBM: these being the 'Integrated Disability and Livelihood Project (IDLDP)' and 'Rights, Rehabilitation, Empowerment for Persons with Disabilities (RRED)'. The centre provides a range of services, including medical check-ups, therapeutic services such as physiotherapy, occupational therapy, and speech and language therapy, as well as assistive devices and prosthetics and orthotics.

In addition to medical and therapeutic services, the centre conducts awareness programs on disability, school-based awareness initiatives, support for forming self-help groups for people with disabilities, advocacy, consultation meetings and free health campaigns. To enhance accessibility, a lift was installed at the centre during this reporting year, improving mobility for all people.

## CRP Chattogram - A.K. Khan Centre

Since opening on October 2, 2012, CRP Chattogram - A.K. Khan Centre has become a provider of rehabilitation services, offering comprehensive care for neurological, orthopedic, paediatric, and other disabling conditions. With a dedicated team of medical officers, physiotherapists, occupational therapists, speech and language therapists, and prosthetist & orthotists, the centre delivers services ranging from clinical care to job placement, home visits, and community awareness programs. Recent developments include the addition of Sensory Integration Therapy, a gymnasium, and an accessible internal walkway. These recent improvements received praise from local leaders, including the Member of Parliament and law enforcement officials. This had led to the centre's reputation as a vital resource for the Chattogram community. These improvements empower individuals with disabilities to lead more independent life.

## CRP Sylhet - Iskandar Shitara Centre

CRP Sylhet - Iskandar Shitara Center, established in May 2017 as the fourth divisional centre, provides essential rehabilitation services including physiotherapy, occupational therapy, and speech and language therapy. Since 2022, the centre has expanded its outreach through monthly Prosthetics and Orthotics camps, offering patient screenings, casting, and follow-up care. The centre regularly subsidizes medical expenses for underprivileged patients and organizes annual medical camps in rural areas to extend healthcare and rehabilitation service access to poor people with disabilities. Additionally, CRP Sylhet actively engages in local social initiatives to raise public awareness on disability issues, reinforcing its role as a key advocate for the rights and well-being of people with disabilities in the region.

CRP Barishal - CARSA Foundation Centre has made impressive strides in providing comprehensive rehabilitation services to the local community. Since its 'launch' in July 2013 it has continued serving as a pivotal divisional hub for rehabilitation services for individuals with disabilities. In 2020, the centre shifted to its permanent facility in Kashipur, which now offers a wide choice of outpatient services, including medical care, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech and language

therapy, prosthetics, orthotics, and assistive devices. This reporting year marks a significant milestone for the centre, as it expanded its services to the 3rd floor of its building. This has been made possible through the generous support of the Dr. KM Maqsudur Rahman Trust. This expansion strengthens the centre's capacity to provide comprehensive, high-quality rehabilitation services to the region.

## CRP Gobindapur, Moulvibazar

CRP Gobindapur is a distinguished centre within the CRP network, with a specialised focus and diverse range of activities that extend beyond rehabilitation services. For those seeking a peaceful retreat surrounded by lush tea gardens and expansive rubber plantations, CRP Gobindapur is the perfect destination. It spans an impressive 13.3 acres and features four beautifully appointed bungalows available for rent located just a 20-minute drive from either the Kulaura Railway Station or the Kulaura Bus Stand, Kulaura Upazila, Moulvibazar, Sylhet. This accommodation caters for foreign and local tourists, offering a unique opportunity to experience the natural beauty and tranquility of the region. The income generated from these rentals supports rehabilitation services, making a stay here not only enjoyable but also

meaningful. The center is also known for its excellent hospitality offering reasonably priced meals, and catering for individuals and groups, ensuring that guests can enjoy delicious local cuisine without moving from the comfort of the center. The experienced and friendly staff are always available to provide a warm welcome and ensure that guests have a comfortable and memorable stay. During 2023-2024, 173 guests stayed here to enjoy leisure and recreation.



## CRP Moulvibazar - Afsarul & Aktarul Haque Centre

CRP Moulvibazar - Afsarul & Aktarul Haque Centre, located in Moulvibazar district, began offering rehabilitation services in April 2011 and moved to its own dedicated facility in February 2022. In a recent development the centre expanded its infrastructure to improve patient care from distant areas, inaugurating new patient accommodation and a second-floor facility in August 2023. This expansion was made possible through generous donations of essential equipment such as patient beds, mattresses, wheelchairs, and trolleys from friends and donors. In January 2024, a canteen was introduced to further enhance patient comfort. In addition to its regular physiotherapy, occupational therapy, and speech and language therapy services, the centre also provides prosthetics, orthotics, and supportive seating solutions.

CRP Manikganj was established with the primary goal of developing skilled human resources among people with disabilities nationwide through vocational training. In addition to its vocational programs, the centre provides outpatient services such as medical consultancy, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech and language therapy, and counseling. This year, to further enhance service delivery, the Head of Programs and department heads from CRP Savar conducted a

follow-up visit. This was to engage with outpatients, spinal cord injury (SCI) patients at the 250-bed Sadar Hospital also with vocational trainees, and local health professionals to discuss their needs and challenges. The centre also introduced a Patient Database Management System (PDMS) for managing outpatients and vocational training activities. This system improves patient care by streamlining operations, enhancing data security, and ensuring structured, easily accessible patient information. Additionally, a team from CBM Australia visited the centre to observe project activities, while CRP Manikganj staff and trainees actively participated in local government-led observances of key events.

## CRP Mymensingh – BAU Centre

### ICRC Supported P&O Camp at CRP Mymensingh

CRP Mymensingh - BAU Centre, established in 2017 at the Bangladesh Agricultural University campus, operates as an essential outpatient facility providing physiotherapy, occupational therapy, and speech & language therapy. The centre also conducts outreach programs for prosthetics, orthotics, supportive seating, and assistive mobility devices, alongside delivering Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) services across the greater Mymensingh region. Despite facing the limitations of a temporary clinical setup and constrained therapeutic spaces, the centre has made significant strides. In this reporting year, it achieved a record number of

patients being treated. New facilities were added including adult gym rooms with parallel bars and a paediatric gym room, enhancing its ability to offer comprehensive rehabilitation care.

# Projects

## Disability Assessment and Rehabilitation Cost Analysis for Injured Workers in Readymade Garments Sector



Workshop on rehabilitation cost analysis methods and cost elements for the referral cases from the RMG sector

The Project started in December 2023 for 18 months and it is funded by GIZ (German Agency for International Cooperation).

### The aim of this project is to:

1. Develop and propose an index of estimated rehabilitation costs based on 100 RMG/other industries workers with work-related injury/disability
2. Develop a disability assessment tool to measure the severity of disability
3. Conduct the disability assessment for up to 100 victims of workplace injury from the RMG sector

### Activities and Achievement of the project:

1. Formation of project team consisting of a Project Coordinator, Admin & Finance Officer, and Referral Focal Person.

2. A day-long workshop was organized on 28th May on rehabilitation cost analysis methods and cost elements for the referral cases from the RMG sector with 25 different stakeholders.
3. A multi-disciplinary team consisting of a physician, physiotherapist, occupational therapist, speech and language therapist, and psychiatrist has been formed to develop and conduct the disability assessment for the referral cases from the RMG sector.
4. The cost index format and Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) for the cost index have been prepared and shared with the respective donor.
5. A draft of Disability Assessment Form has been developed by the disability expert team, which will be finalized through a workshop with the relevant stakeholders.



## Equitable and Inclusive Health and Rehabilitation for Persons with Disability

Since December 2022, CRP has been implementing "Equitable and Inclusive Health and Rehabilitation for Persons with Disability (EIHRPD)" project in partnership with CBM Global Disability Inclusion to generate evidence for providing equitable and accessible rehabilitation services to persons with disabilities. This has led to the implementation of different local and national level activities including capacity-building training of health professionals and OPD (Organization of Persons with Disabilities) members. Also, community-based disability screening and awareness campaigns, financial support to OPDs, institutional rehabilitation services, and national-level advocacy to ensure spinal cord injury (SCI) rehabilitation services in government health system, accessibility and audits etc.

**Project activities, implemented in 2023-2024 are mentioned below:**

- ❑ A Spinal Cord Injury (SCI) Unit has been established at the 250-bed Manikganj District Govt. Sadar Hospital and trained 60 health professionals on SCI Management.
- ❑ 20 members from 4 partner OPDs received capacity-building training on OPD management, leadership, advocacy, safeguarding, etc.
- ❑ 1,707 patients including people with SCI received rehabilitation services from CRP Manikganj Centre.

- ❑ 50 customized assistive devices have been provided to individuals with disabilities.
- ❑ National and international days including International Women's Day, International Day for Persons with Disability, and SCI Day were observed.
- ❑ 6,880 IEC (Information, Education and Communication) and project visualization materials have been distributed to raise awareness.
- ❑ A detailed module in Bengali on SCI Management for service providers, patients, and carers has been developed.
- ❑ OPDs are advocating and raising their voices at different committees for their rights according to the Bangladesh Disability Rights and Protection Act 2013.
- ❑ A dissemination program was organized with Civil Surgeon (CS), Upazila Health and Family Planning Officers (UHFPOs), Community Health Care Providers (CHCPs), and community people to ensure accessibility at Upazila Health Complex (UHC) & Community Clinics (CCs) based on 6 accessibility assessment reports.
- ❑ OPDs organized 11 community-based disability screening and awareness campaigns and provided free medical and rehabilitation services to 850 people.

## Meaningful Social Access for Persons with Mental Health Needs

CRP has two Mental Health Day Centres in Savar and Mirpur under the Meaningful Social Access for Persons with Mental Health Needs Project. These centres offer various mental health services such as psychiatric consultancy, occupational therapy, and psychological counseling, followed by follow-up postdischarge, and community reintegration that helps individuals with mental health needs reintegrate into society.

Comprehensive mental health services have been provided to 233 people and their caregivers in this reporting year. The analysis emphasized improvements in self-care, productivity, and social skills for daily community living. Interestingly, over 84% of clients demonstrated independence in important areas such as timely meals, medication adherence, personal hygiene, and maintaining a consistent sleep cycle.

Furthermore, 95 clients returned to their studies after being discharged. 82% of clients also developed strong social ties within their community, with 61% engaging in regular recreational activities and socializing with peers. Family support, assessed on a ten-point scale, revealed positive results, with approximately 74% of families scoring seven or above, indicating significant support for family members navigating mental health challenges.

Over the year, vocational training in different trades like computer skills, tailoring, shop management, etc., has been provided to 40 clients with mental health needs, followed by income-generating activity support to 15 clients for their economic sustainability. Mental Health service has transformed access to basic mental health support for individuals in need within their communities entirely cost-free. Operating through mobile phones and the internet in the project areas, this year witnessed the delivery of 230 sessions spanning Dhaka, Manikganj, Tangail, and Gazipur districts.





## National Legal Aid Day Observation

The CRP EKOTA Project, supported by the Manusher Jonno Foundation (MJF) and funded by USAID, started in March 2023. During this reporting period, several key activities of this project have been completed:

- ❖ 144 self-help group meetings were held, enabling persons with disabilities and their families to discuss challenges and solutions.
- ❖ Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) were signed with 3 Disabled Persons Organizations (DPOs) across two districts, facilitating regular executive committee meetings to enhance organizational functioning.
- ❖ Skill Development Training sessions focused on cow and goat rearing, vegetable growing, jute cultivation, and tailoring were organized, benefiting 100 participants, some of whom have started income-generating activities.
- ❖ Community gathering events were arranged to encourage accountability among service providers and to raise community awareness about disabilities in 3 Upazilas (Saturia of Manikganj and Savar & Nawabganj of Dhaka).

❖ Various national and international days relevant to disabilities are observed collaboratively with local government to promote awareness.

❖ Local-level government officials received orientation on the Bangladesh Rights and Protection of Persons with Disabilities Act 2013.

❖ 2 (two) social support groups were formed to advocate for better access to government services for persons with disabilities.

❖ A two-day-long leadership training program was conducted to empower participants with crucial leadership skills and tools to advocate for their communities.

These activities contributed to the following results:

- Access to Health Services: 25 individuals
- Access to Education: 10 individuals
- Access to Social Safety: 100 individuals
- Access to Legal Aid Services: 7 individuals
- Access to Agriculture: 20 individuals
- Representation in Committees: 13 individuals

## Regional Inter-Professional Master's Program in Rehabilitation Science-Phase II, funded by SAARC Development Fund

Farewell - 6th batch students of M.Sc. in Rehabilitation Science

The second phase (July 2022 to June 2027) of the project, “Regional Inter-Professional Master’s Program in Rehabilitation Science-Phase II” funded by the SAARC Development Fund (SDF) provided 28 scholarships to the students of the 6th and 7th batch from SAARC Member States. Thirteen students (12 Bangladeshi and 1 Sri Lankan) of the 6th batch completed the part II (final) examination under the University of Dhaka. In addition, 16 students (12 Bangladeshi, 2 Nepalese, 1 Bhutanese, and 1 Sri Lankan) of the 7th batch have completed part I. Students of the 7th batch visited clinical and other activities of CRP Mirpur, Dhaka and significant sites (University of Dhaka, National Monument, National Museum, National Parliament, etc.) in the capital city, Dhaka, to gain their locational awareness and orientation. They also

participated in a placement tour at 2 non-government organizations working for the treatment and rehabilitation of persons with disabilities – Social Assistance and Rehabilitation for the Physically Vulnerable (SARPV) at Cox’s Bazar and Handicap International - Humanity & Inclusion (HI) at Dhaka. Two CRP and BHPI staff members participated in a workshop on the introduction and terms of use of “Foreign Students Information Management Software” at the Special Branch, Bangladesh Police.

16 students, 3 faculties, and 9 local alumni participated in the 22nd Asian Spinal Cord Network (ASCoN) Conference in Dhaka and presented 6 papers. Two faculties participated in a virtual event on “Environmental Physiotherapy Advocacy Day” organized by Prof. Dr. Lori Maria Walton, University of Scranton, USA.

## Other Departments

### Human Resources

The CRP Human Resources department is structured to effectively handle the diverse range of responsibilities and services it provides. Several functional areas are included within the department, such as recruitment and selection, employee recruitment, training and development, compensation and benefits, and employee support. The team is composed of highly skilled professionals dedicated to meeting the needs of both CRP and its employees.

A strong commitment to inclusive employment practices and equal opportunities for all employees has been maintained by the HR department. It is believed that the success of CRP is deeply connected to the diversity and inclusivity of its workforce. 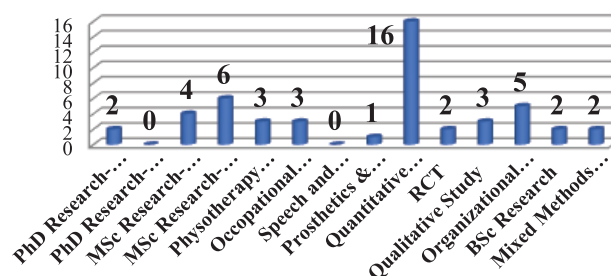

### Research, Monitoring & Evaluation

The Research, Monitoring & Evaluation department of CRP has reported its research-related information for the last Financial Year 2023-24. The bar chart showed that around 21 (twenty one) research studies have been conducted at several departments of CRP after getting approval from the Ethical Review Committee (ERC) of CRP. Importantly, 2 PhD and 4 MSc research have been carried out by foreign institutes. Similarly, 5 organizational studies, 1 peer reviewed scientific publication, and 3 conference papers were published within the mentioned period. Additionally, one research project was carried out in cooperation with GIZ and Bangladesh Business and Disability Network (BBDN) within this fiscal year.

The Advocacy and Networking Department assists in creating awareness among the public regarding disabilities, focusing on road traffic accidents and falls from height; these are the main reasons for spinal cord injuries in Bangladesh. It also arranges campaigns at different educational institutes to create awareness among the students and authorities about disability issues and provide suggestions to create a disability-friendly accessible environment. Different educational organizations, especially medical colleges and Government organizations like BPATC, NAAND, BARD, etc., visit CRP as a part of their study course or professional requirement, and the Advocacy and Networking

department organizes and coordinates these visits and represents CRP services and activities.

This department maintains policy-level advocacy with national and international NGOs, civil society representatives and government officials. It also organizes day observations, such as the International Day of Persons with Disabilities, Spinal Cord Injury Day, International Road Safety Day, World Occupational Therapy Day, etc.

In this reporting year, the Advocacy and Networking Department organized and attended more than 45 visits, meetings, seminars, 8 day observation, and community engagement programs.

## Rising Against the Odds

### Sumaia's Journey of Resilience and Empowerment



At the age of 13, Sumaia Akter from Betgati, Borguna, was forced into marriage due to her father's inability to support their large family. Soon after, she became pregnant, but her husband, unwilling to shoulder the responsibilities of parenthood, abandoned her, leaving her to face the challenges alone. Despite her fragile health, Sumaia gave birth and attempted to reconcile with her estranged husband, to no avail.

Tragedy struck again on July 24, 2022, when Sumaia was involved in a devastating auto-rickshaw accident, which left her paralyzed from the waist down. Diagnosed with a spinal cord injury, she was referred to CRP Savar for rehabilitation. During her time at CRP, Sumaia learned essential skills for navigating life in a wheelchair and successfully completed vocational training.

Undeterred by her circumstances, Sumaia embarked on a journey toward independence, starting a small tailoring business where she

sewed clothes and accepted customer orders. In 2023, her determination was further rewarded by support from CRP's livelihood support program (CBR), which aims to empower individuals with disabilities to reintegrate into their communities. CRP provided her with a sewing machine and raw materials, enabling her to expand her business.

Through constant resilience, Sumaia has transformed her life, emerging as a role model within her community and demonstrating that with the right support, people with disabilities can not only survive but thrive. Now, Sumaia dreams of further expanding her business, contributing meaningfully to her family, and showing the world that her disability does not define her. Her story stands as a lighthouse of hope, illuminating the fact that even in the face of overwhelming adversity, one can find the strength to rise and inspire others.
